

The Ohio Psychology Internship Program (previously named NEOUCOM) offers 8 full time, APA accredited internship positions running from July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011. Interns receive a stipend of \$15,500 for the year. Interns all participate in a seminar series during the first quarter of their internship. Interns train in one of the following training sites:

TRACK A – HEARTLAND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH:

Heartland Behavioral Health is an Adult Inpatient Psychiatric State Hospital where interns train full-time for the internship year. Interns work with both forensic and acute care patients in group, individual and assessment modalities. Patients include voluntary and involuntary civil status patients, forensic patients adjudicated not guilty by reason of insanity, forensic patients adjudicated incompetent to stand trial – nonrestorable, and forensic patients adjudicated incompetent to stand trial – restorable. Some of the activities the interns participate in are: assessment of newly admitted patients, DBT group, NGRI groups, competency restoration services, SAMI-oriented services, illness management and recovery groups and psychological assessment.

Interns are active and valued members of the multidisciplinary treatment team which meets daily. Interns work in a newly refurbished state-of-the-art facility with an office outside of the treatment units, equipped with computers. Interns have access to didactic trainings offered to the hospital staff and also have the opportunity to be involved in hospital committees.

TRACK B – SUMMIT PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSOCIATES, INC. AND COLEMAN PROFESSIONAL SERVICES:

Interns in Track B spend 20 hours each week at Summit Psychological Associates, Inc., a large group private practice providing outpatient therapy and forensic services to the community. Interns also spend 20 hours weekly at Coleman Professional Services, an adult and child community mental health center.

At **Summit Psychological Associates, Inc.** interns provide outpatient individual and group therapy to adults and children. Interns complete psychological assessments with children and adults. Interns have the opportunity to lead domestic violence and drug and alcohol groups and

to conduct the initial diagnostic assessments required for group inclusion. Interns also provide MRDD services and have the opportunity to work with EAP services.

At **Coleman Professional Services**, interns provide outpatient individual and group treatment to adults and children with a wide range of mental health needs. Interns participate in the intake process, have exposure to emergency services, and participate in forensic services. Interns also complete psychological assessments with adults and children.

TRACK C – COLEMAN PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AND CHILDREN’S ADVANTAGE:

Interns in Track C spend 20 hours each week at Coleman Professional Services, an adult and child community mental health center as described above. Interns also spend 20 hours weekly at Children’s Advantage, a child, adolescent, and family community mental health center.

At **Children’s Advantage**, interns provide individual, group and family treatment to children, adolescents and their families. Interns are able to participate in multidisciplinary treatment teams to provide treatment for children with special needs such as Autism. Interns complete psychological assessments with children and consult with the agency psychiatric staff.

TRACKS D – FORENSIC SERVICES - SUMMIT PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSOCIATES, INC.:

Interns in Track D provide a wide range of outpatient **forensic services** to adults and children on a full time basis each week at Summit Psychological Associates, Inc. Interns conduct treatment and educational groups for drug and alcohol clients, domestic violence clients, prostitution clients, and sex offenders. Interns are active members of the treatment team for clients referred from Mental Health Court, Drug Court and Family Court. Interns are involved in psychological assessments for custody, child welfare cases, sex offending, competency to stand trial, NGRI, and pre-employment evaluations for police and fire departments. Interns have the opportunity to go on jail visits, a police ride along, to observe an autopsy and work in a jail setting during their year of forensic training.
